HISTORY OF CHRIST LUTHERAN CHURCH

The vision of our great grandparents, our grandparents and our parents, started congregations like this one and made it possible for us, their children, to carry on their dreams and continue their work in Christ.

The history of Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church dates back to just before the beginning of the 20th century when the territory around Ellis was sparsely settled and the town of Ellis was widely know as a railroad center. The few Lutheran settlers (mostly of Austrian and German background) who settled in this county were contacted and served by traveling missionaries. In April 1894, the first Lutheran Pastor, the Rev. E. Genter, came from Russell, Kansas, and held the worship service in the Lutheran settlers homes in Ellis.

The first stationed Pastor was the Rev. E. Gentner, who resided in Ellis for several years and held the worship services in the old Methodist Church, which was located on the site of the present Methodist Church. When the Rev. E. Gentner left this community in 1987, the Rev. Theodore Maier took over the mission work and was installed Oct. 24.

A congregation was established and steps taken to build a church, which was built in the country at a central spot for the congregation which was called St. Johns. After St. John's Lutheran Church was dedicated in the fall of 1989, the Rev. Maier resigned and the Rev. Bruno Huhn came to carry on the work, beginning the first of the year 1899. The St. John's Parsonage was built in 1900.

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The Rev. Huhn resigned in 1902 and the Rev. F.W. Mensing was called. In 1904 the congregation divided and every fourth Sunday, services were held in Ellis in the Episocopal Church, located at 725 North Washington St. In the fall of 1905, the Rev. Mensing resigned and the Rev. G. Adolph Doering was called and took over in November of 1905. He stayed two years. After a short vacancy the people asked the Rev. Johannes Holzberger of Russell of the Nebraska Synod, to take charge of this Mission. He soon gained their confidence and organized a congregation in 1907 which was know as Ellis Lutheran Church.

During his pastorate the old Congregational Church together with four lots

were purchased December 1910 for \$1000. This building became Christ Lutheran Church and was located on the south end of the present building. The Rev. Holzberger served Christ Lutheran Congregation from 1907 to 1912, when the Rev. Johann Hiltner of St. John's Lutheran Church, took charge serving both congregations. At this time, Christ Lutheran Was under the Pastoral care of the Iowa Synod and the American Lutheran Church in America. The Rev. Hiltner served from 1912 to 1914. The Rev. Gottlieb Kolb then served both congregations from 1914 to 1922 when he resigned due to failing health. In 1921, the Rev. John G. Bunge was called to serve both congregations, residing in the parsonage of St. John's north of Ellis.

During the year 1921, the Ladies' Aid was organized as a service organization for the local church. They held bazaars, served dinners and meals for civic organizations to raise funds to help meet the expenses of special projects for the church. At a September meeting, it was voted to make English available for the Sunday Schootchildren.

Jan. 3, 1923, Christ Lutheran congregation voted to be incorporated, to join the Iowa Synod and to introduce English in the worship service along with the German. Because of the language question, St. John's Lutheran Church and Christ Lutheran Church discontinued sharing the service of one pastor and the Rev. Bunge moved to Ellis in April of 1923, to serve only the Christ Lutheran Congregation. A house in Ellis was rented for \$300 per year for the pastor and his family. His salary was \$1200 per year.

In May 1923, the Luther League was chartered and the choir was organized. In September 1923, a heavy thunderstorm hit Ellis and lightning struck the steeple of the old Lutheran Church, setting it on fire. The church was damaged to the extent that it was considered beyond repair. The worship services were held temporarily in the then Mulvey Hall on 818 North Washington Street.

It was voted to erect a parsonage and the building be so constructed, that the basement could be used for worship and other church functions. The Ladies' Aid donated \$1000 towards a new parsonage and the men of the congregation volunteered to do the labor. The building committee, with Ludwig Deutscher as chairman, were William Sauer, Louis Spilker, Gustav Deutscher, Christ Huck Sr., George Reiss, Pastor Bunge and councilmen Fred Egger, Christ Armbruster, and Phillip Manz. The congregation voted to hire a man to do Ludwig Deutscher's farm work so he would be free to be head carpenter.

The building progressed so the first worship service in the parsonage basement was held on Christmas Eve of 1923. By Feb. 1, 1924, the parsonage was ready for the Rev. Bunge to move in. As time went on, the congregation came to realize that the basement was not large enough to accommodate all the members and was not the proper room for worship. In November 1924, preliminary steps were taken for building a church and the contract for the present church building was awarded to Mont J. Green Construction Co. of Manhattan, Kansas, for the amount of \$19,000.

The building committee was: Ludwig Deutscher, John Huber, William Sauer, Jacob Deutscher, Martin King, Fred King Sr., William Hagen Sr., and Ernest F. Hamburg. The men of the congregation were to furnish all the sand, make the necessary excavations and build the basement. This work was done with teams of horses and scrapers and the men hauled the sand with wagons and horses. The building material was shipped in on the U.P. Railroad and the men hauled it from the railroad station with their horse drawn wagons.

The Ladies Aid furnished the pews and the pipe organ. The Luther League bought the church bell and an extra collection secured the needed funds of \$710 for the new high altar and sanctuary lights.

On Sunday, May 10, 1925, the corner stone was laid. It was a gift from the Oakley Marble Co. The church was dedicated five months later on Oct. 11, 1925. The Rev. Holzberger, Pastor from 1907 to 1912, was invited but was unable to attend the dedication of the church.

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In 1926, it was voted to increase the church council from three to six members with two council members elected each year for a three-year term. In 1927, it was voted to elect all council members each year.

Men serving on the council during the years of 1916 thru 1926 were: Jacob Deutcher, Fred Egger, Frank Massier, Fred Keller, William Sauer, Chris Armbruster, Martin King, Philip Manz, Jacob Wendling and Ernest F. Hamburg.

In 1924, with the resignation of the Rev. John G. Bunge from the Iowa Synod, it was voted to retain Pastor Bunge as Pastor and together with him, rejoin the Nebraska Synod. Because of problems with the Rev. Bunge's change from the Iowa Synod to the German Nebraska Synod, Christ Lutheran did not join the German Nebraska Synod. After Pastor Bunge's resignation in 1926, the congregation voted to affiliate with the German Nebraska Synod, predecessor of the Midwest Synod.

The Rev. Rudolph Moehring was called to serve the congregation as Pastor. June 12, 1927, the first Mission Festival was held with a morning and afternoon worship service and a dinner at noon. In 1928, the congregation purchased the lot south of the church for \$300. To pay for the lot, each man and woman was to pay \$2 and each child who had a job pay \$1 and the Ladies' Aid promised to pay the balance.

At the 1929 annual meeting, it was voted to have an English service every third Sunday. Up to this time, the worship service and the meetings were all conducted in German.

Prior to 1930, the Pastor's salary was paid annual and after that paid quarterly. It was voted that confirmation be one year in German and the following year in English.

January 1931, the Sunday School was organized. It was voted to install a gate to the balcony of the church to be kept locked and opened only when needed. In 1932, the Rev. Moehring resigned as pastor. It was then voted to have English and German services alternately. In 1933, the Rev. Victor Pietzko was called and served as Pastor until January 1935, when he resigned.

In 1935, Dr. Otto W. Heick was called to serve as Pastor. After 1935, all the minutes of the congregational meetings were recorded in English. In 1939, Dr. Heick requested a leave of absence for a trip to Germany during the summer. Area ministers served our congregation during Dr. Heick's leave of absence.

In 1941, white confirmation robes were used for the first time and were purchased by the Ladies' Aid. The streets were paved and guttered around the church at a cost of \$185 in 1943.

January 1944, the Women's Missionary Society was organized which is now known as the Lutheran Church Women. The congregation voted in 1944 to invite to our German worship services, in accordance with Army regulations, the German prisoners of World War II who were held at the Walker Air Force Base. It was also voted to discontinue the second Christmas day worship service.

During 1944 and 1945, the art glass windows made by Arthur Michaudel Studio in Chicago, IL were installed in our church. The first art glass window "The Good Shepherd" was a gift from the Ladies' Aid, in honor of the children of Christ Lutheran Church. The second art glass window, "The Ascension" was given as a memorial by our ex-service men and their families in memory of Frank Arthur Sauer, who died in the service of our country in Word War II. The balcony windows, "The Symbols of Christ" were given by the Women's Missionary Society. The Narthex window, "The Baptism of Jesus" was given by the Sunday School in memory of the charter members. All other art glass windows were given as memorials by members. The art glass of all the windows was put into the window frames by the men of the congregation.

At the 1945 annual meeting, it was reported the membership of the congregation as 410, the Sunday School 133 enrolled, the Luther League 19 members, the Junior choir 23 members, the Ladies' Aid 34 members and the Women's Missionary Society 27 members.

At the 1946 annual meeting, a new constitution was adopted and went into effect. It was voted to have English worship services every Sunday. Also during the year a piano was purchased for the choir. Dr. Heick accepted a call to Chicago, IL in 1946. The Rev. Warren Churchill accepted the call to replace Dr. Heick.

In March 1947 a men's organization, "The Lutheran Brotherhood" was organized. The first electronic Baldwin organ was ordered in October 1947, and delivered and installed in April 1948, to replace the old pipe organ, which was given to Pastor M.C. Linnerson of Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Ogallah. It was dismantled and moved to Minnesota where he reassembled the organ. An Altar Guild was organized to be responsible for the Altar paraments and Communion ware. Christ Lutheran Church, under the leadership of the Rev. Warren Churchill, hosted the annual Midwest Synodical Convention in May 1948. Starting in 1948, all organizations were to give an annual report at the annual meetings and council members were elected for three year terms, two being elected each year and not serve more than two terms.

At the annual meeting of 1949, it was voted to pass the offering plates and receive the offering during the worship services. Before this time, offering was received in the Narthex of the church as they left the worship services. Senior choir robes were purchased and the choir loft was built in the front of the church where the pipe organ used to be. Before this time, the choir was seated in the balcony.

In 1950, the Rev. William H. Goede was called as pastor to replace the Rev. Churchill who had resigned. A Tower Chime System given as a memorial was installed during the year; also it was voted to have the legal voting age to be at least 18 years of age.

At the 1951 annual meeting, it was voted to eliminate the annual Mission Festival and observe a Mission Sunday in each quarter or four times a year. An every family subscription to the Lutheran magazine was budgeted. It was voted to accept the revised model Constitution for congregations of the United Lutheran Church in America. It was voted in 1952, to have the Daily Devotion booklet sent into every family home.

In 1953, the congregational membership was down to 366 members, and the Sunday School enrollment had dropped to 118. In 1955, the Sunday School enrollment increased to 168 which proved the need for and educational building. A public Thank offering received at Thanksgiving was \$377 and was given toward salaries of Missionaries in the Foreign Fields.

Seven area Synods met at Kansas City, MO, in June 1954, to merge into the Evangelical Lutheran Synod in the Central States of the United Lutheran Church in America.

The Rev. J. Franklin Shirck arrived June 1, 1955, to replace the Rev. William H. Goede as Pastor.

At the 1956 annual meeting it was voted to build a Parish School building. Due to the fine cooperation of the congregation, the building was erected at a minimum cost of \$24,300. The Rev. W.O. Zahlis, a retired Pastor living in Ellis, was asked to translate Christ Lutheran German records into English. He was paid \$50 for his services.

On Sunday, June 16, 1957, we celebrated the 50th anniversary of our church and also had the dedication of the Parish School building. That same evening, Ellis was hit by a flood, flooding the Church and parish unit basements.

In 1958, the confirmed membership reached 396; the Sunday School enrollment was up to 180 and the Luther League had 36 members. Two hundrend and twenty-five Service Books and Hymnals were purchased, costing \$881. Also in 1958 a reception was held for two sons of the congregation, Arthur Homburg and August Homburg Jr., in honor of their ordination into the ministry.

On Feb. 1, 1959 the United Lutheran Church Women presented a Mission Study program "Our North Amerian Neighbors" for the congregation.

In the year 1960, the church exterior brick was tuck-pointed at a cost of \$5,063 and the roof was reshingled at a cost of \$1,840. The interior of the church was redecorated in 1961.

In June of 1962, four Lutheran Church bodies, The American Evangelical (AELC), the Augustana, The Finnish Evangelical (Suomi Synod), and The United Lutheran (ULCA) merged together to form the Lutheran Church in America (LCA). Following the merger, in late 1962, The Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Central States met and divided its area. Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and half of Missouri became Central States Synod, while Iowa and Nebraska became a Synod of their own and Texas and Louisiana became a joint Synod. Central States Synod was then divided into districts. Because of this merger Christ Lutheran became a part of the Western District of the Central States Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.

The Ladies' Aid voted to disband as an organization in November 1962, and the funds left in the treasury be used to purchase a glass top desk for

the Narthex as a remembrance. The Christ Lutheran Church Memorial Fund was established in 1964. The following year the balcony carpet was donated and installed.

Under the new Constitution, adopted in 1966, it was voted to increase the council from six to nine members. A loud speaker system was given and installed as a memorial. In 1967, the Lutheran Church Men, formerly called the Brotherhood, furnished the material and built the outdoor nativity scene.

In Jan. 1968 the Rev. Earl Wall, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Hays, KS served as our Vice-Pastor. During this time a new parsonage was built for a cost of \$27,347. Also approximately 100 chrismons were made by women of the congregation for the annual Christmas tree decorations.

In March 1969, the Rev. William E. Jones arrived to serve as our Pastor. The old parsonage, sold at a public auction, was removed and the area used as a parking lot. The new parsonage was dedicated June 15, 1969. During the year, individual communion glasses, given as a memorial, were used for the first time.

In August 1970, the Rev. William E. Jones resigned and the Rev. Earl Wall again served as our Vice-Pastor until August 1971, when the Rev. Melvin T. Peterson came to serve as our Pastor.

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In 1971, a used air conditioner, purchased from Fort Hays State University, was installed in the church by the men of the church. In September, the parsonage was paid for in full and burning of the mortgage was on Sunday morning Oct. 29, 1972, following the worship service. In 1974, the first electronic organ was replaced by a new electronic Conn organ purchased for \$6,200. It was dedicated on Sunday, Nov. 17, with an organ recital by Dr. William D. Wilkins, organist and professor of music at Fort Hays State University.

New church pews with upholstered seats were installed in 1976. Many of these pews were given as memorials. They were dedicated on July 4, during the Bi-Centennial Celebration, in our church. The old pews were auctioned with congregational members having first choice. The interior of the church was redecorated and red carpeting was installed. In November 1978, the Rev. W. Joseph Bullock answered our call to replace the Rev. Melvin T. Peterson who resigned in May.

During the years of 1979 and 1980, the new Lutheran Book of Worship books were added to our worship service. The Pastor's office was moved into the Parish School basement. An Eternal Light, given as a memorial, was hung in the Sanctuary. The Church Library was officially established in the Parish School building for use by the congregation. Storm windows were installed on the church basement windows. Protective plate glass was put over the exterior of all the art glass windows of the church.

In 1981, the new symbolic front doors and stained glass windows, above the doors, were given as memorials. The symbol of the wooden doors represents the Lutheran Rose. They symbols of Christ on the windows represents the "Bread of Life", "lamb of God" and the "Light of the World" encircled by a symbol of the Trinity. The calors used are symbolic of the church year. The window beneath is two layers of hand blown glass with the name of the church inscribed on the glass. The glass for these windows was imported from Germany. The windows were made by the High Plains Stained Glass Co. of Hays, KS.

An underground passageway was build between the Church and the Parish School building to make them more accessible. The church basement was renovated with wood paneling on walls, ceiling lowered, new light fixtures installed and carpeting laid on the floor. New drapes for the basement windows were made and donated by a member. New bathroom fixtures were donated and installed by members and an extra storage area built. A used kitchen rage was given for the church kitchen by the Ellis School District #388. A telephone was installed in the church basement for the first time. A lot, across the street east of the church, was purchased and donated by a member for a parking lot.

In1988 Pastor Bullock accepted a call to New Gottland Church at McPherson, KS., his last Sunday here was September 23rd. The Rev. John Binder, Administrator of the Good Samaritan Home of Hays, KS, served as Vice-Pastor during the vacancy. In May of 1989, the Rev. Lyle M. Knuth accepted the call to Christ Lutheran and will serve as its pastor until June 24, 2007.

Today and in the future may we, the members of Christ Lutheran Church, continue to promote the Christian principles that our forefathers had envisioned for the future generations.
